# Foyer & Floor 50 - Presidential Suite

The Crafts Council of Ireland, supported by Culture Ireland, presents a showcase of the best of Ireland's craft and design in the foyer and Floor 50 of Justus Lipsius Building.

The installations, which were curated by Jonathan Legge, consist of floor and wall coverings, tables and chairs, sofas and lighting, and many crafted objects in ceramics, glass and wood, arranged for use. The pieces have been designed and made by more than 30 craftspeople registered with the Crafts Council of Ireland.

In the foyer, tall shelving, filled with Irish literature and craft, creates a quiet space where the visitor is encouraged to select a book and read or chat with colleagues seated around a large white lacquered table by Nest Design. Several key cultural institutions including the Royal Dublin Society, National Museum of Ireland and Chester Beatty Library have loaned the books that are on display.




